WHEREAS, Black Alabamians during the Reconstruction

Period played an integral role in this Legislature; these

members substantially contributed to our state's well-being in

multiple areas, including economic, educational, religious,

social, political, and human rights; and

WHEREAS, during the Reconstruction Period between 1868 and 1878, Black Legislators ably represented a variety of interests: Freeman and formerly enslaved; rich and poor; urban and rural; industrial and agricultural; highly educated and self-made; and even Republican and Democratic; unquestionably, the unique diversity of backgrounds held by these early office holders positively and perpetually enriched our state and its governmental processes; and

WHEREAS, like all Senators and Representatives, these public officials made significant sacrifices for the common good of our state; they endured strains on their physical and mental health, as well as the loss of income, business opportunities, and family time; however, between 1868 and 1878, the burdens carried by Black Legislators were even more difficult as they were justifiably concerned for their

WHEREAS, the contributions of these Black Alabamians to the legislative process were both distinctive and distinguished; their perspective often best represented the needs and rights of the common person, irrespective of his or her color; and their passion for equality and their commitment to justice, which had been learned first hand, served as a constant and continuing force that eventually ensured equal representation for all; and

WHEREAS, as our state and nation progresses into this new century of change and recommitment, it is especially appropriate to look backwards to those who came before and who gave of themselves for the betterment of all Alabamians; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That in order to honor these Black Alabamians who have served in this Legislature, we direct the following actions:

- 1. The preparation of three identical plaques containing the names of each Black member of the Alabama Legislature who served during the Reconstruction Period of 1868 to 1878.
- 2. Each plaque shall contain a listing of such
  members by chronological order of service, with the

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L	appropriate	title,	Senator	or	Representative,	and	the	county

3. One plaque shall be displayed in the Rotunda of the State Capitol.

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- 4. One plaque shall be displayed on the grounds of the State Capitol.
- 5. One plaque shall be displayed in the second floor entrance area of the Alabama State House.
  - 6. The Executive Director of the Alabama Historical Commission shall determine, in consultation with the sponsor of this act, the location of the plaques in the Rotunda and on the grounds of the State Capitol. The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives shall determine, in consultation with the sponsor of this act, the location of the plaque in the State House.
- 7. The cost of the plaques are to be paid from funds appropriated to the Legislature.
